## Character Counts Contest for 2006

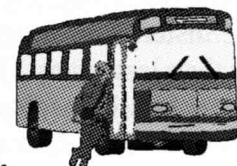

## NEWS FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT FOR PROGRAM

The FCE 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration tuned in with “Rhythm of the Future” as the theme of the 2006 Annual Conference, Nashville, TN. Early on Friday, speaker, Madelyn Swift, reminded us of the messages we send and accountability connected with learned experiences in “Teach Your Children Well: Character Development and Integrity”.

As the conference continued, more programs emphasized children and their education with “Is The Cyberhighway Friend or Foe?” and “Family Choice-Media”. The introduction of “Coming to a Screen Near You”, “Books, The Other Channel”, instilled in children a love of reading, planning, planned routes on the Cyberhighway and the effect of video games on our children. More programs for children will be developed.

Angela Bates presented “Africa American Quilts and the Underground Railroad”, the history of how African American Women designed and used quilts on the Underground Rail Road and “African American Women and their Church Hats”, the evolution of hairstyles and the special church hats were included.

“Pearls and More Pearls”, Bob Keast took us into the fresh water pearl saga by film at his “garden” of implanted mussels from the pristine waters of the Tennessee River.

One and one half hours FCL training in Teaching Techniques was awarded to attendees of “And the Winner Is” to learn what judges are looking for in a winning Program Award Book and what makes a winning Spirit of FCL entry.

Lastly, Kari Berit Gustafson brought us two related programs, “Embracing Your Aging Self” and “Mental Fitness: Creating a Health Club for Your Mind”. Kari soothed our anxious minds, and explained the best health club you can belong to, which she addresses with humor, intelligence and insight – and without condescension. Her advice in managing stress is to keep physically and mentally fit, to entice loved ones to get out of his/her ruts, and to live life fully engaged.

## PUBLIC POLICY NOTES

### Highlights of Federal Level Legislation

**Interstate Abortion Bill Clears Senate.**  
The Senate voted to make it a crime to take a pregnant minor to another state to obtain an abortion without her parents’ knowledge. The senate vote was a victory for antiabortion activists who have tried in vain to overturn the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision that legalized abortion nationwide.

### Gas Treatment of Meat

A bitter regulatory battle over the safety of a packaging system that can keep meat looking fresh long past it’s shelf life is escalating. At issue is the growing practice of spiking sealed packages of meat with small doses of carbon monoxide. The gas is harmless at the concentrations being used, but it can keep the meat looking bright red even as it spoils.

### GOP Bid on Wages, Estate Tax is Blocked

Senate Democrats blocked a Republican bid to combine a tax cut for the wealthy with a wage increase for the working poor, adding a volatile economic issue to this fall’s congressional campaigns.

### Immigration Debated

Republican leaders in the US House of Representatives are planning to hold an additional 19 hearings on immigration in 12 states across the country to garner support for strict border controls they say will help stop illegal immigration. House Speaker Dennis Hastert (R-IL) and Majority Leader John Boehner (R-OH) are both sponsors of the hearings, which they hope will address concerns with the legislation passed by the US Senate that differs considerably from the bill approved by the House.

The Senate bill S 2611 allows some illegal immigrants to earn US citizenship, while the House version HR 4437 calls illegal immigration a felony and proposes stricter border security. The representatives are optimistic that negotiations with the Senate can begin soon in order to present a unified bill to President Bush before the November congressional elections.

**Directions:** Located just east of Grantsville, Maryland on Alt. 40 (The Old National Pike). If traveling west on I-68, use exit 22, turn right, at stop light turn left, continuing west on US 40 about two miles. Penn Alps is on the right side of the road and has a large parking lot. There is a small state park next to Penn Alps with a nice shaded picnic area. If you enter Grantsville, you have gone too far. If traveling east on I-68, use Exit 19, turn left, then right in Grantsville on US 40 continue east about one mile.

### **Information about Penn Alps**

Penn Alps Restaurant and Craft Shop are housed in the last log hospitality house on the National Pike still serving the traveler. It is situated between a 1797 gristmill and a historic stone arch bridge (the longest single span of stone in America when built in 1813). Three of its six dining rooms were once part of the log stagecoach stop, Little Crossings Inn.

Spruce Forest Artisan Village, a part of the extended Penn Alps campus, has grown from a few cabins to some 12 log and frame structures of early vintage, two of which date to the Revolutionary War Period. Most of these provide studio space for artisans. Artisans work in various media, including: bird carving, basket making, handloom weaving, and hand-thrown pottery.

Also produced in the village are stained glass art, hand-forged iron, hand-crafted teddy bears, and hand-crafted natural soaps.
