MARYLAND FCE CONFERENCE

The 2024 Maryland FCE Conference will be held October 21-22 at the Holiday Inn Express, 1020 Kent Narrows Road, Grasonville MD 21638, on Kent Island on the Chesapeake Bay. This is the same hotel where we held the 2023 conference.



An ample breakfast is included for those who stay at the hotel. Lunch on October 21-22 and dinner on October 21 will be included in your registration package. Arrive at the hotel on Sunday, October 20, to go on the cruise and take advantage of Chesapeake Bay cuisine in a local restaurant.

There will be a tour. On Sunday, October 20, we will take a narrated 70-minute Patriot Cruise on the Miles River out of St Michaels, Maryland. The boat is covered and handicapped accessible. The cost will be \$25.00 per person. The boat **LEAVES** at 2:30 PM, so please be there by 2 o'clock for boarding. Be sure to check the "cruise" box on the registration form and include the \$25.00 with your registration. If you are going on the cruise, you will probably want to stay Sunday night at our hotel, so be sure to check the box for Sunday night's stay.

The conference program will begin with registration at 10:00 AM on Monday, October 21, and will continue through mid-afternoon on Tuesday, October 22. Confirmed programs include:

• The Chocolatier's Palette. Did you ever wonder where chocolate comes from? Jill Sandler, from The Chocolatier's Palette, will explain how chocolate is made and will also offer us the opportunity to buy some of her wares.

• Kathleen M. McGuinness, a member of the Montgomery County Commission on Aging, will speak on aging in place and home health care in Montgomery County (where most of us live).

• Christopher B. Emery, author of *White House Usher: Stories from the Inside* and 2 mysteries will speak about his years on staff in the White House during the Reagan and Bush administrations. He will have books for sale (\$20.00 cash).

• Cheryl Bush, a Queen Anne's County Extension agent whom we met last year, will help us to assure food safety in our homes based on a home audit, like a restaurant food inspection, that each of us should complete in advance and bring to the conference program.

• Exploring our Eastern shore history and heritage. Gail Owings, Executive Director of Eastern Shore Heritage, Inc. will share "Stories of the Chesapeake Heritage Area."

• As we enjoy our changing seasons, Judy Wink from the Chesapeake Bay Environmental Center will tell us about migratory birds of the Bay.

MARYLAND FCE BYLAWS REVISIONS

Please Read - These will be Voted on by the Members Attending the Annual Conference

Article V Officers

Section 2. Qualifications

Delete: B. Shall have agreed in writing have to her/his nomination.

C. Shall have written endorsement of her/his Member Association affiliate.

D. Should be serving or have previously served as an elected officer of her/his Member Association affiliate.

Section 10. Duties of Secretary Current: C. Ascertain the number of the voting delegates present by calling the roll of the Board and the Member Association presidents.

Revised: C. Ascertain the number of the voting delegates present by *recording attendance of the Board and the members present*.

Section 11. Duties of Treasurer Current: C. Pay authorized expenses of Maryland FCE upon approval of a designated person. Revised: C. Pay authorized expenses of Maryland FCE upon approval of *the Board*.

Article XI Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meeting

Current. A. Member Associations/members shall be notified of the Annual Meeting at least ninety days prior to the meeting.

Revised: A. Member Associations/members shall be notified of the Annual Meeting at least *sixty* days prior to the meeting.

Current: B. The voting delegates at the Annual Conference shall be the Board and Presidents of Member Associations in good standing or their certified alternants. A certified alternate shall be a member of the Member Association.

Revised: B. The voting delegates at the Annual Conference shall be the Board and *all MAFCE members present and in good standing*.

Current: C. The majority of the certified voting delegates registered shall constitute a quorum. **Revised:** C. The majority of *voting members*

registered shall constitute a quorum.

Article XII Member Associations

Current: Affiliated Member Association Duties may be assigned in the order listed. Carroll, PG, etc. **Revised:** Affiliated Member Association duties may be assigned.

ACWW's first new Rural Women in Action Project



Ukrainian students at the Educational Hub hosted in Bucharest

Planting the Seeds of Peace is a 12-month program designed to develop and implement a practical training course for Ukrainian refugee children centered around the ecological growing of plans and vegetables. The project will be implemented in Bucharest, Romania at a school hosting 200 Ukrainian children.

Background

We are delighted to announce that this is the first project funded under our new Rural Women in Action Fund program and is an Education and Community Development project. The project will be implemented by ACWW member society Geopolitical Alliance of Women, a Ukraine-based women's organization passionate about promoting women's inclusion in society and the Association of Ukrainian Romania Teachers who will be assisting in the implementation of the training program.

The aim of the project is to help children recover from the stress and trauma of war through the therapeutic practice of gardening. The participants will attend monthly classes during the school year to gain knowledge of horticulture. Alongside this the participants will attend practical gardening sessions.

The project was conceived to help children impacted by the conflict in Ukraine to recover through a practical and conscious approach to agriculture and horticulture. The children will learn about growing plants, soil restoration and climate change. The practice of gardening has been proven to be a very therapeutic tool for those who have suffered trauma, it has been found to reduce stress, anxiety and depression and to improve psychological wellbeing.

APPLE BROWN BETTY

With apple season coming soon, why not make a great apple dessert!

Ingredients:

 6 cups thinly sliced apples (Granny

Smith, Honeycrisp, or your favorite variety)

- 1/4 cup orange juice (or lemon juice)
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup cold butter, cut into small pieces
- 1 cup breadcrumbs (or crushed graham crackers)

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat your oven to $375^{\circ}F(190^{\circ}C)$.
- 2. Prepare the apples: Toss the sliced apples with the orange juice to prevent browning.
- 3. Make the crumble: In a bowl, mix the flour, brown sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Cut in the cold butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in the breadcrumbs.
- 4. Layer the ingredients: In a greased baking dish, layer half of the apples. Sprinkle with half of the crumble mixture. Repeat with the remaining apples and crumble.
- 5. Bake: Cover the dish with foil and bake for 30 minutes. Remove the foil and bake for an additional 15-20 minutes, or until the apples are tender and the topping is golden brown.
- 6. Serve: Let it cool slightly before serving. It's delicious on its own or with a scoop of vanilla ice cream!

SEPTEMBER IS SUICIDE PREVENTION MONTH

Suicidal thoughts, much like mental health conditions, can affect anyone regardless of age, gender or background. Suicidal thoughts, although common, should not be considered normal and often indicate more serious issues.

Warning Signs

Here are a few other warning signs of suicide:

- Increased alcohol and drug use
- Aggressive behavior
- Withdrawal from friends, family and community
- Dramatic mood swings
- Impulsive or reckless behavior

Suicidal behaviors are a psychiatric

emergency, call 988 to reach the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline:

- Collecting and saving pills or buying a weapon
- Giving away possessions
- Tying up loose ends, like organizing personal papers or paying off debts
- Saying goodbye to friends and family If you are unsure, a <u>licensed mental health</u>

professional can help assess.

Individual Impact:

- 79% of all people who die by suicide are male.
- Although more women than men attempt suicide, men are 4x more likely to die by suicide.
- Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among people aged 10-14, the 3rd leading cause of death among those aged 15-24 and the 12th leading cause of death overall in the U.S.
- 46% of people who die by suicide had a diagnosed mental health condition but 90% may have experienced symptoms of a mental health condition
