
Fun at the Panama Canal


"Makin Tracks to the Fair" August 12 – 20

Duncan Hines Cookies

1 Pkg. Devil's Food Cake Mix 2 Large Eggs ½ Cup Oil ½ Cup Chocolate Chips

Mix all ingredients. Shape into balls Bake 350° for 10 to 11 minutes

Cake Mix Cookies

1 White cake mix
1 Egg 8 tsp. Melted butter
4 oz. softened cream cheese
2 tsp. cinnamon
Milky Way Caramel Bites
3 – 4 Tablespoon Cinnamon sugar

Beat together cake mix, egg and melted butter until a soft dough forms. Add the cream cheese and cinnamon and re-beat until well mixed. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. Roll dough into 24 even dough balls. Press each ball flat and place a Milky Way Caramel Bite into the center. Form the cookie dough around the candy bar and roll into a ball again. Roll the ball in the cinnamon sugar and place on a baking sheet. Bake 350° for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool on the cookie sheet for 2 minutes before removing to a piece of parchment paper. Let cool completely. Store in sealed container. Yield 24 cookies.

Cherry Crowns

1 Cup Butter or Oleo
3 oz. Cream Cheese
1 Cup Sugar
1 Large Egg (Separated)
1 Tsp. Almond Extract
2 ½ Cup Finely Ground Blanched Almonds
30 Red Candied Cherries, Halved

Beat butter and cream cheese at medium speed with electric mixer until soft and creamy; gradually add sugar, beating well. Add egg yolk and almond extract, mixing well; gradually stir in flour. Cover and chill one hour.

Shape dough into one inch balls; dip top of balls in lightly beaten egg WHITE, then into the almonds. Place two inches apart on LIGHTLY greased cookie sheet. Press a candied cherry half on center of each ball. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes. Remove to wire rack to cool. Yield 5 dozen.

SCAMMERS OFFERING TO HELP WITH DISABILITY APPLICATIONS

Scammers are trying to get personal information from people by pretending to help with applications for disability benefits and claims. A recent alert from the Social Security Inspector General warns of this phishing scam, and — whether or not you've started an application for benefits — these scammers could contact you. They're taking a shot in the dark, hoping that you have started an application, and hoping you'll give them a little more info over the phone. To "complete the process," they might ask you to give, or confirm, your Social Security number or bank account numbers.

If scammers get your information, you could face <u>identity theft</u> and benefit theft. So here are a few things you can do to help protect yourself:

- Never give your Social Security number or account numbers to someone who calls you.
- Don't wire money or send money using a prepaid debit card. In fact, never pay someone who calls out of the blue.
- If you have disability benefits, regularly check their status, and review your statements to make sure they're right.
- Pressured to provide your information?
 That's a sure sign of a scam. Hang up immediately and report it to the <u>Social</u> Security Fraud Hotline and the FTC.

If you have questions about disability benefits, or get calls offering help with them, call the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213.

BOGUS DEBTS, BOGUS COLLECTIONS

At the FTC, we sue abusive debt collectors and try to do right by people who've been harmed by unlawful practices. But we also try to protect people from being harmed in the first place. That's exactly why I'm here: to warn you about debt collectors calling about debts that the FTC knows are bogus.

The bogus debts supposedly are payday loans from these companies: USFastCash, 500FastCash,

OneClickCash, Ameriloan, United Cash Loans, AdvantageCashServices, or StarCashProcessing. The companies are real, but if you're hearing from anyone other than those companies, the debts are fake and you don't need to pay.

Sometimes, if they can't collect money owed to them, companies sell lists of those debts to debt collectors. But, in this case, we know that didn't happen. The company that processed and serviced loans from these companies told the FTC that it never sold any customer or account information to debt collectors. Their lawyer even filed a legal declaration saying that.

Even so, we've still heard about abusive calls from debt collectors claiming to be collecting money owed to the companies listed above – and we already know that's not true. But we also know that many of the people who have been called never even had a loan with those lenders in the first place – so the debts themselves also are bogus.

What to do if you get a call from a debt collector who says you owe money to one of those companies? You have rights. Ask for a validation notice, which says what you owe and to whom. After you get it, consider sending a letter saying that you don't owe the debt. If you're getting debt collection calls, check your free credit report at annualcreditreport.com. If a debt you don't recognize shows up there, follow the instructions to dispute the debt. And, as always, report any problems to the FTC.

ABOUT ZIKA VIRUS DISEASE

Zika virus disease (Zika) is a disease caused by the Zika virus, which is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected *Aedes* species mosquito. The most common symptoms of Zika are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting for several days to a week after being bitten by an infected mosquito. People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of Zika. For this reason, many people might not realize they have been infected. However, Zika virus infection during pregnancy can cause a serious birth defect called microcephaly (http://www.cdc.gov/ncbddd/birthdefects/microceph aly.html), as well as other severe fetal brain defects.

Once a person has been infected, he or she is likely to be protected from future infections.

Zika virus was first discovered in 1947 and is named after the Zika Forest in Uganda. In 1952, the first human cases of Zika were detected and since then, outbreaks of Zika have been reported in tropical Africa, Southeast Asia, and the Pacific Islands. Zika outbreaks have probably occurred in many locations. Before 2007, at least 14 cases of Zika had been documented, although other cases were likely to have occurred and were not reported. Because the symptoms of Zika are similar to those of many other diseases, many cases may not have been recognized.

In 2015, the Pan American Health
Organization (PAHO) issued an alert regarding the
first confirmed Zika virus infection in Brazil. On
February 1, 2016, the World Health Organization
(WHO) declared Zika virus a Public Health
Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC).
Local transmission has been reported in many other
countries and territories. Zika virus will likely
continue to spread to new areas.
Specific areas where Zika is spreading
(http://www.cdc.gov/zika/geo/index.html) are often
difficult to determine and are likely to change over
time. If traveling, please visit the CDC Travelers'
Health site for the most updated travel information.

Prevention

If you live in a state (http://www.cdc.gov/zika/vector/range.html) or area(http://www.cdc.gov/zika/geo/index.html) with the mosquito that spreads the Zika virus and you are concerned about Zika, learn how to build your own Zika Prevention Kit.

Your kit should include items that will reduce your risk of getting Zika. Reducing the risk for Zika is particularly important for pregnant women. Your kit should include:

- A bed net
- Insect repellent (http://www.cdc.gov/zika/prevention/index.ht ml)
- Permethrin spray
- Standing water treatment tabs
- Condoms

Here's what you can do to control mosquitoes outside your home.

- Install or repair and use window and door screens. Do not leave doors propped open.
- Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out any items that hold water like tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpot saucers, or trash containers. Mosquitoes lay eggs in water.
- Tightly cover water storage containers (buckets, cisterns, rain barrels) so that mosquitoes cannot get inside to lay eggs.
- For containers without lids, use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.
- Use larvicides to treat large containers of water that will not be used for drinking and cannot be covered or dumped out.
- Use an outdoor flying insect spray where mosquitoes rest. Mosquitoes rest in dark, humid areas like under patio furniture, or under the carport or garage. When using insecticides, always follow label instructions.
- If you have a septic tank, repair cracks or gaps. Cover open vent or plumbing pipes. Use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.

Here's what you can do to control mosquitoes inside your home

- Keep windows and doors shut and use air conditioning when possible.
- Keep mosquitoes from laying eggs inside your home. Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out any items that hold water like vases and flowerpot saucers.
- Kill mosquitoes inside your home. Use an indoor flying insect fogger or indoor insect spray to kill mosquitoes and treat areas where they rest. These products work immediately, but may need to be reapplied. Always follow label directions. Only using insecticide will not keep your home free of mosquitoes.
- Mosquitoes rest in dark, humid places like under the sink, in closets, under furniture, or in the laundry room.
- Use an indoor fogger or indoor insect spray to reach and treat areas were mosquitos rest inside the home.
