Plastic Canvas Ribbon Angels (I have the directions)

#### PUTTING THE "WIN" IN WINDOW CLEANING



#### Window Frames and Windowsills

Use a small dustpan or vacuum attachment to get rid of dust, soot, cobwebs, and insects. You can use cleaning wipes on plastic and vinyl window frames. If you're using a spray product, spray it on the cloth and only use it for the sills, not the glass.

#### Window Glass

Spray the cleaning product on a clean cloth then clean the glass, avoiding the windowsill and frame. For the outside, use outdoor window glass spray products. They come with a nozzle that attaches to your hose. Spray from at least five feet away, and let the glass air-dry.

#### Blinds

Dust with a clean, soft brush, or vacuum brush attachment. Clean with water and use a soft cloth or sponge. Dry with a clean, soft cloth and use furniture polish on the blinds to make cleaning easier next time. An electro-static duster can be use on and between the slats.

#### Window Coverings

If they're washable, put them in the washer on the delicate cycle. If not, you can have them dry cleaned. You can also vacuum and then use a fabric spray to remove odors.

#### STAY ORGANIZED AND SAFE

When it's time to straighten out your cleaning cabinet, remember that keeping your cleaning products safely stored is important 365 days a year. In addition to child-proofing your cabinets and closets, here are some of our top tips:

• Always keep cleaning products secured and up and out of the reach of children and pets.

• Because it's so easy to get distracted these days, always be sure to tightly close product caps when they are in use, and never leave buckets alone where curious littles ones can get into trouble.

• Store products in their original containers and keep the original labels intact. Product use and storage, disposal instructions, precautions and first aid instructions vary according to their ingredients.

#### **MEASLES**

Measles is a highly contagious, vaccinepreventable viral infection. Cases of



measles have recently been identified in Maryland, and have been localized to a small geographic area within zip codes 21208, 21209 and 21215.

The Maryland Department of Health has advised that people might have been exposed to measles at the following locations at the following times:

4000 Old Court Road in Pikesville, MD Tuesday, April 2 from 9:00 a.m. till 1:00 p.m. Sunday, April 14 from 10:30 a.m. till 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 16 from 9:15 a.m. till 12:30 p.m.

Market Maven (1630 Reisterstown Rd, Pikesville) on Sunday, April 14 from 11:45 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Seven Mile Market (201 Reisterstown Rd, Pikesville) on Sunday, April 14 from 12:45 p.m. to 3:15 p.m.

If you think you or your family member have symptoms of measles, call your doctor before going to the office so staff can take measures to prevent possible spread to other patients. Do not go to child care, school, work, or out in public if you have symptoms of measles. If you think you or a family member might have been exposed to measles, or if you have questions about vaccinations, contact your healthcare provider.

#### **Symptoms of Measles**

Early symptoms of measles are high fever; runny nose; cough; and red, watery eyes. Usually, one to four days after the early symptoms, a red rash appears on the face and spreads to the body.

Some people may suffer from severe complications, such as pneumonia and encephalitis (swelling of the brain). They may need to be hospitalized and could die. Measles may cause pregnant woman to give birth prematurely, or have a low-birth-weight baby.

#### **Transmission of Measles**

Measles spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Also, measles virus can live for up to 2 hours in an airspace where the infected person coughed or sneezed. A person

with measles is contagious beginning 4 days before the rash appears until 4 days after the rash begins. Measles symptoms typically develop 10-14 days after exposure to the virus.

#### **Prevention of Measles**

Measles can be prevented with MMR vaccine. The MMR vaccine is very safe and effective. Two doses of MMR vaccine are about 97% effective at preventing measles; one dose is about 93% effective.

Before the measles vaccination program started in 1963, an estimated 3 to 4 million people got measles each year in the United States. Of these, approximately 500,000 cases were reported each year to CDC; of these, 400 to 500 died, 48,000 were hospitalized, and 1,000 developed encephalitis from measles. Since then, widespread use of measles vaccine has led to a greater than 99% reduction in measles cases compared with the pre-vaccine era. However, measles is still common in other countries. Unvaccinated people continue to get measles while abroad and bring the disease into the United States and spread it to others.

#### There is no link between vaccines and autism.

Some people have had concerns that Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) might be linked to the vaccines children receive, but studies have shown that there is no link between receiving vaccines and developing ASD. In 2011, an Institute of Medicine (IOM) report on eight vaccines given to children and adults found that with rare exceptions, these vaccines are very safe.

A 2013 CDC study added to the research showing that vaccines do not cause ASD. The study looked at the number of antigens (substances in vaccines that cause the body's immune system to produce disease-fighting antibodies) from vaccines during the first two years of life. The results showed that the total amount of antigen from vaccines received was the same between children with ASD and those that did not have ASD. Vaccine ingredients do not cause autism.

One vaccine ingredient that has been studied specifically is thimerosal, a mercury-based preservative used to prevent contamination of multidose vials of vaccines. Research shows that thimerosal does not cause ASD. In fact, a 2004 by the IOM concluded that "the evidence favors rejection of a causal relationship between thimerosal-containing vaccines and autism." Since 2003, there have been nine CDC-funded or

conducted studies that have found no link between thimerosal-containing vaccines and ASD, as well as no link between the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine and ASD in children.

Between 1999 and 2001, thimerosal was removed or reduced to trace amounts in all childhood vaccines except for some flu vaccines. This was done as part of a broader national effort to reduce all types of mercury exposure in children before studies were conducted that determined that thimerosal was not harmful. It was done as a precaution.

Besides thimerosal, some people have had concerns about other <u>vaccine ingredients</u> in relation to ASD as well. However, no links have been found between any vaccine ingredients and ASD.

#### National Human and Sex Trafficking Statistics 2019

Millions of men, women and children across the country and world are victims of human



trafficking for forced labor, sex and other types of exploitation.

It is estimated the economic cost of trafficking related to underpayment of wages and recruiting fees is at least \$20 billion annually. The costs to human beings on a personal level are impossible to put into numbers.

It is recognized today there are three types of human trafficking: labor, sex and war slavery.

• Sex trafficking, defined as, where a commercial sex act is mandated by force, fraud or coercion, or where the person who is forced to perform the act is not at least 18 years old; or

• The harboring, recruitment, transportation, provision or obtaining of an individual for labor or services through using fraud, force, or coercion for the purpose of subjecting the individual to involuntary solitude, debt bondage, slavery or peonage.

#### The Basic Problem of Human Trafficking

Getting a grip on the size of the human trafficking problem is challenging; it is difficult to collect statistics due to the fact of slavery being done in secret, and there is a good deal of discrepancy between the figures available. But there is a report that claims up to 27 million people live in some type of modern day slavery throughout the world. According to the International Labor Office, there are 21 million victims of human trafficking across the globe. In the US, it is estimated that 17,000 people are put into some form of slavery every year.

#### Human Trafficking By the Numbers

• Since 2007, the National Human Trafficking Hotline has gotten reports of 22,191 sex trafficking cases in the US.

• Since 2016, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children has estimated that one in six endangered runaways were likely to be sex trafficking victims.

• There are nearly 21 million victims of human trafficking around the world. Seventy percent are trapped in forced labor; 26% are children; and 55% are girls and women.

• The US Department of Labor reports that 139 goods from 75 countries were made by child or forced labor.

• The number of minors under 18 who are victims of human trafficking around the world is 5.5 million.

• Victims spend an average of 20 months in forced labor.

• Around the world, the International Labor Organization estimates there are 4.5 million people who are forced into sexual exploitation.

• In 2014, the Urban Institute stated the underground sex slave economy is up to \$40 million annually in Denver, and \$290 million in Atlanta.

• 5 million work in forced labor in construction, manufacturing, mining or hospitality.

8 million are domestic workers.

• 7 million forced labor victims are working in agriculture.

• Human trafficking earns profits of up to \$150 billion per year around the world.

• Sexual exploitation makes great profits for operators, but forced labor saves them money. In Germany, Chinese kitchen workers were paid only \$808 for an 80 hour work week. They should have been paid per German law a wage of \$2558 for a 40 hour workweek.

#### What can you do?
